Connecting the Dots The Intentional Flow of Worship To you see it?

Or have you never really given much thought to it at all? There is a pattern and a flow to worship that is intentionally thought through and planned... but more about that in a moment.

Today, I would like to challenge you! For the next 3-4 weeks, pay closer attention than usual to the elements used in worship... the scripture spoken, the prayers offered, the songs sung, the sermon given. See if you can find how they go together. See if you can connect the dots.

When we plan for worship, we do so with the hope and prayer that each element, flowing together, will lead the congregation to a better understanding of, closer relationship with and greater desire to serve the Lord our God! We aim to keep true to a central theme which is based upon the scripture lesson of that day. We do this so that the truths of God's Word are evident throughout the entire time of worship.


And ultimately, as you will see if you connect the dots on the picture below, it all leads back to one thing... if you connect the dots, it will lead you straight to the cross!

My review of the book "Sticky Faith — Practical ideas to nurture long-term faith in Teenagers" By Jon Wolters

<u>Chapter 3 — Sticky Identity</u>

As I started reading this third chapter of Sticky Faith, I realized something very quickly. . . . this chapter has way to much information to review in only one page in the Connections. So what I decided to do is hit a few of the high points.

I asked myself before starting this chapter "what do I think affects the identity of students in regards to Sticky Faith?" My answer in a word was family. I thought that a strong family would be the most important piece in the identity development of students. Family is part of the equation, but it is only a small portion of the answer! Our authors, through all their research, have found that identity can be found in this equation:

DNA + Family + Social Environments = Identity

This idea of identity development in part involves what researchers call "nature" and "nurture (found on page 51).

Nature means the physical components that impact kids' identities - both how they look (eye color, hair, height, weight) and less visible aspects such as those hidden away in their DNA.

Nurture is made up of many factors. Family background (parents, siblings, extended family and cultural heritage) as I thought, is huge basically because of how much time they spend with their families. The social environment kids grow up in (hometown, school, neighborhood) is another element of nurture. When we look at social environment we have to realize that a student's identity is both personal ("Who am I") and communal ("Who am I as a part of us?"). So our kids are trying to figure out not only who they are, but also who they are in a larger community.

The researchers found that with this equation and the elements of nature and nurture there was still a gap. **Enter God.**

It was found that spiritual development was deeply connected to identity development. It was also found the spiritual development is less understood and more mysterious. The reason for this is the fact that God's relationship is unique to each student. Here is a direct quotation from page 52: "Even after all of our research and interviews with transitioning youth group kids, we still can't prescribe a foolproof fixed agenda to help all students grow in their spiritual identities or know who they are becoming in their journey with Christ. God's work in each life can neither be programmed nor predicted."

Another aspect of identity development that we now need to take into consideration is "social media and networks". Facebook, MySpace and Twitter, the "friends" our students have never met except online. Travel teams and schools of choice may also be leading to Identity confusion in our students.

What can we do to help our students understand "Who they are" and "Who they are in their community"? I truly think that the question should not be what **can** we do? The question has to be what **should** we do? The answer involves all of us in the church, not just the Pastor or Youth Worker; Sunday School Teachers or Youth Leaders, but all. Every last one of us!!

Here is one principle that the authors suggests: **4+1**. What this means is four years of high school (9th - 12th grades) plus one additional year. At Trinity Church some of us are already working with this idea. We write notes and cards to college aged students, not just college freshman and not just those in college. We send care packages and we greet them when they return home on breaks. These are all great things that are going on at Trinity Church, but could we do more? Or could more of us do something? Consider how you could reach out to both our high school students and college age students. If you need ideas please talk to me - I would love to help you connect with our kids. We all need to remember our baptismal vows!!

Again there was a lot that I was not able to cover from this chapter. I challenge you the check out one of the copies of Sticky Faith from the youth table and start your own journey to helping students have Sticky Faith!!

7 Habits of a Highly Effective Steward

Much has been written about the habits it takes to be a highly effective person, or a highly effective family or a highly effective teen. This seven-part series will reflect on the habits of a highly effective steward.

Since stewardship is a part of discipleship, and discipleship is a journey for each of us, we hope that these habits will help us reflect on this area of our Christian life.

Habit 4: Be A Faithful Example

"These commandments that I give you today are to be upon your hearts. Impress them on your children. Talk about them when you sit at home and when you walk along the road, when you lie down and when you get up." (Deut. 6: 6,7)

If we are to be good models for our children, we as parents must have God's Word reflected in our own lives. Secondly, we need to be alert to the countless opportunities given us to teach our children a godly perspective on life, abilities and possessions. Modeling good stewardship is the best teaching tool. Parents who tithe, save, live on a budget, minimize debt and give of their abilities and time to help others set an excellent example for their children.

Start early. When children are old enough to receive an allowance, talk about their responsibility to give the first part back to God. Talk openly about tithing, why we do it and the good things that happen because we give. By the time kids are in high school or even middle school it is almost too late to begin teaching. By that time, their money habits are mostly set. While there is still opportunity at any age to teach them, we can better mold our children's behavior if we reach them before they start to practice.

Look for ways to involve children in giving activities. Invite them to participate in the discussion of where to give and why. Talk about how good it feels to give to others. Explain how giving is really receiving and allow them the opportunity to experience that joy.

Instilling a strong work ethic in our children is invaluable. Money doesn't just magically appear out of a bank machine, but is earned through work. Remember, a child cannot learn money management unless he has money to manage, and unless he has earned that money himself. Otherwise he is giving and spending his parents' money and not his. (Dynamic Steward, July 2003)

Working for something also teaches the value of delayed gratification. There is greater reward in something that is achieved versus free handouts. Our children will grow up with more respect for the value of money and what is required to earn it. Over indulgence by parents destroys the need for initiative and motivation.

As parents, we need to be patient and persistent. Let them fail. Mistakes are inevitable, but when you allow for failure you are entrusting your kids with responsibility.


