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Endings & Beginnings...



For some of us we love new things and for others of us change is uncomfortable and risky.

As we enter a time of endings and new beginnings, let's encourage each other and help one another in this new season of joy and trepidation!





Dear Trinity Family,

Do you see that mesa in the picture above? That's known as Chimney Rock in Abiquiu, New Mexico. And I CLIMBED THAT! On an early morning hike <u>before</u> coffee. I know, I can hardly believe it either. The trek up there wasn't just rocky with several sharp and precarious slingbacks, but the elevation also changed by several thousand as we made our way up. Breathing became harder. Legs began to feel like they were made out of lead. A bit of dizziness set in. The change in elevation took a toll.

Signing up for a 4 mile hike before breakfast the night before didn't *sound* so difficult....but the hike proved much harder in the actual experience. Even though the *number* of miles wasn't daunting, the *effort* of those miles proved more challenging than a simple 4 mile walk. This experience - something that sounds easy, proving to much harder in the actual doing - tracked with another part of my life.

Part of what I brought with me into my spiritual retreat at Ghost Ranch wasn't just my eagerness to learn about Sabbath from Rev. Dr. Carol Bechtel or my joy to be in the desert (one of my favourite landscapes) or the desire to get away for some solitude (any parent of younger children can relate!)...a big part of what I brought with me was the weight of my decision to formally transfer my ordination from my home denomination, the Christian Reformed Church, to the Reformed Church in America.

And this decision, this change in my life both vocationally and personally, has proven to be much harder in the actual experience of it. On paper, the change isn't a big deal. A bit of paperwork. An interview followed by a classical exam in September. Yet in real life, the change for me is an uprooting of belonging and vocational hopes. Disorienting. Exhausting. And hard.

The past few years in my home denomination have been tumultuous as we have fractured and fought over the issue of human sexuality. I hoped that we could find a way through that honored our theological differences and still valued our belonging to each other despite those differences. Like the CRC did in the 1990s over women in office when we agreed to live in a theological tension of "both/and" because we valued belonging over being "right". This time, the CRC has valued being theologically right over belonging to each other across differences of interpretation.

While I could persist longer in the CRC (practicing what I am preaching about belonging over being right), I am concerned that the partnership between the CRC and the RCA that makes it possible for me to serve Trinity Reformed Church may be in jeopardy. And I do not want to anxiously wait each year to see if the CRC Synod severs the CRC's ties with the RCA. I have found a church home with you all and I want to protect that.

Serving in Holland Classis these past two years, I have also witnessed the cost of the RCA's decision to value belonging to each other rather than forced agreement. I have deep respect for those who have chosen to live in the tension and still serve alongside each other. Because of this shared value, I realized that I can find a home in the RCA. But the change comes with significant loss - of denominational identity, of a sense of belonging, of dear colleagues and congregations. But even as I grieve all that is changed in my (almost) former denominational home, I am also excited about the new possibilities and opportunities to serve in the RCA and in Holland Classis and with you all.

The universe is before our eyes like a beautiful book in which all creatures, great and small, are as letters to make us ponder the invisible things of God


Belgic Confession Article 2

As we continue our summer worship series, we're considering the birds of the Bible AND the birds in our own backyard!


You're each challenged to be able to name and identity 10 of the most common backyard birds here in Michigan by the end of our series on August 24th!

This month's Trinity volunteer is Shirley Perez!

Shirley volunteers weekly at Refresh, a collaborative project between Community Action House and First United Methodist Church.

Refresh's mission is to provide access to services that increase dignity and eliminate barriers to housing stability.

First United Methodist provides showers in their church building to persons experiencing homelessness and, together with Community Action House, they provide access to services, case management, personal care items and clothing, mail collection, haircuts, and a light meal.

All this is made possible by volunteers like Shirley...





Q: How did you get started volunteering at Refresh?

Shirley: About six years ago, Pastor Deb was telling me about a new program that First United Methodist Church had started a few months before. She thought it might be a good volunteer opportunity for me. I have been working every Friday morning since! Usually 7:30am - 11:30am. Refresh also happens on Tuesday mornings and Wednesday evenings.

Q: What do you do at Refresh?

Shirley: At 8am the doors open and people rush in to sign up for showers. There are two large bathrooms each with showers in the gym area, one for women and one for men. My job is to welcome them and find out their needs. Usually a total change of clothes while waiting for their name to be called. Each person is allowed 15-20 minutes for showers. There is a menu to order breakfast while each person waits their turn for showers. Not everyone showers. Some come to associate and talk with friends. Some have appointments with Community Action House workers who work in our building and help with housing, etc. One person told me he comes because it's the only place he feels safe. How sad. It makes me sad to think what his life must be like.



I work my area with usually two other people going in and out of the closet getting clean clothes, hygiene products like toothbrushes, toothpaste, deodorant, first-aid products, sweatshirts, seasonal clothing, and some shoes. Whatever they need, we to supply.

We also have a laundry and washer/dryer for dirty clothes and to restock the closet. We try to keep some appropriate things on hand for their job interviews, too.

We can have from about 70-100 people at times. Winter brings other issues: COLD WEATHER. I have worked two nights in the warming center this past winter, with temperatures around 10 degrees and below outside. As the people come in we give them a blanket and a pillow. In the gym they find a corner to sleep. We supply hot drinks and snacks, and in the morning they turn in the pillow and blanket and put their name on a large plastic bag for use on the next frigid night.

I also at times take home extremely dirty clothes that need extra cleaning or mending: I put on missing buttons, hem pants, and put new strings in sweatshirts and sweatpants.

We also have haircuts every other Friday morning and someone who does "footcare" a few times a month.

Q: And, finally, how does your volunteering deepen your relationship with God and your neighbor?

Shirley: I have enjoyed working these people at Refresh. Most of these people just need some love and encouragement. They need to be treated with dignity. And I enjoy helping and putting a smile on their faces.

And when people ask me why I do this, I just tell them what God told us to do: to love our neighbors.

And be thankful we can help.

Thank you to Shirley and all the Refresh volunteers for loving and serving our neighbors experiencing homelessness!

How did you happen to get nicknamed "wisdom?"

Sophia - Hi, Rex. I don't know why they keep calling me that. My name is Harriet and always has been.

People have been giving me strange nicknames ever since I married

Zebedee and moved to Galilee with him.

Well, Harriet/Sophia, are you willing to share any of these nicknames with us?

Sure, why not?

The first one I remember was when the twins, James and John, were starting elementary school. I walked with them into the homeroom and demanded that the teacher seat them in the first row and right in the middle. I wanted them to have the best view of the teacher and the place where they would have the least distractions from the "antics" of their classmates. A good mother fights for the best for her kids, right? When I was walking out, I heard a strange name, "Helicopter." I had no idea what they were talking about. Every year after that, most of the teachers and most of the parents apparently thought that was my nickname.

I also had a talk with the PE scribe who ran the after-school games program, mostly soccer around here, you know. Anyway, I made sure he knew that James and John were really good midfielders and he should be sure to make sure they were on the "A-team" and starters. He called me "Madam Bair" even though my name tag said "Ms Bar-Jonah." All the rest of the parents of the kids on the team apparently thought that was my name too. I was called that a lot. The strangest name, even stranger to me than "Helicopter" was "Monday Morning." I asked several friends

Jesus calls twelve men to be His apostles. Among them are "James son of Zebedee and his brother John (to them he gave the name Boanerges, which means Sons of Thunder)" (Mark 3:17).

This is the only place in Scripture that mentions the designation of the sons of Zebedee as the Sons of Thunder, and there is no stated explanation as to why Jesus named them this...



what that might mean. None of them had any idea why a day two days after Sabbath would be used as a nickname. Maybe someone in the future will know?

Anyway, the twins are often called by their nickname, "The Sons of Thunder." There again, what a crazy name. Zebedee's name doesn't mean "Thunder." His name is a variation of "Patience." Where does this "Thunder" stuff come from?

Interesting! Did your mother have a lot of nicknames too? I guess I'm really asking if you see yourself being a good mom as your mom modeled motherhood for you?

Oh no! My mother was so quiet and weak that she never spoke up or defended any of us. My aunt was my role-model. She was always saying that "It's the squeaky wheel that gets the grease." Or "No one will ever give you anything unless you ask for it." Her favorite was probably "Know what you want and aggressively go for it." I think good parents should teach their kids to think that way and should model that behavior. I try!

Rumor has it that you had a similar conversation with Rabbi Jesus

about the status of your twins when Jesus as Messiah overthrows the Romans and sets up his new Jewish Empire. Did you really ask him to install James and John as his "Righthand" and "Left-hand" administrators in his Empire?

Yes, I did. Every mother thinks her kids have amazing potential, don't they? I think James and John would do a great job as Secretary of State or Secretary of Defense or something similar. Actually they would be great at any job Jesus needs doing. One can't start too soon in planting the seeds. I want Jesus to seriously consider them for those jobs anyway. We can hardly wait for Jesus to unleash his miracle power and oust those Roman invaders and restore Israel to David's glory and beyond. I want my boys to be in the inner circle, for sure. Most of us think it's going to happen very soon. It can't happen quick enough for most of us.

What did Jesus say to you?

He answered like any good politician would who doesn't want to commit to a position. He said something about serving and not ruling. He said something about the


last being first and the first being last. I got it. He didn't want to commit to James and John in those positions yet. I had to ask though and now he will have their names in the back of his mind for those positions.

Well, Sophia/Harriet, thanks for chatting with me. We have heard a lot about you and you have certainly made things a lot clearer. One last question if you will? Do you think the twins have that nickname because they are so "thunderous", so "Ox in the Spice Shop" type of guys? What are they like?

Oh, they take after their dad. They both are very patient, very thoughtful, and not pushy at all. I keep telling them that they'll never get anywhere or get anything unless they push for it. They just laugh at me and give me a hug, one from each side. I call them, "My Teddybears."
